- <sup>2</sup> The Legislature failed to elect a Senator for the term beginning March 4, 1899, until February 7, 1900. Seated March 5, 1900.
- <sup>3</sup> Died in office September 16, 1859. Mortally wounded in a duel by David S. Terry, Chief Justice, California Supreme Court.
- <sup>4</sup> Resigned from office November 29, 1873.
- <sup>5</sup> Also served as a Member of the U.S. House of Representatives from California.
- <sup>6</sup> Elected as Douglas Democrat but later changed to Union Republican.
- <sup>7</sup> Resigned from office November 30, 1950.
- <sup>8</sup> Died in office July 30, 1964. Also served as a Member of the U.S. House of Representatives from California.
- <sup>9</sup> Seated November 10, 1992.
- <sup>10</sup> Elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of George Hart. Seated December 7, 1891. Also served as a Member of the U.S. House of Representatives from California.
- <sup>11</sup> Elected September 1850; term expired March 3, 1851.
- <sup>12</sup> Elected September 1850.
- <sup>13</sup> Not Seated until February 16, 1857.

- <sup>26</sup> Appointed and then elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Leland Stanford. Seated August 8, 1893.
- <sup>27</sup> Appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Clair Engle. Seated August 5, 1964. Resigned December 31, 1964.
- <sup>28</sup> Also served as a Member of the U.S. House of Representatives from California.
- <sup>29</sup> Appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Pete Wilson. Seated January 10, 1991.
- <sup>30</sup> Died in office June 21, 1893.
